Master naturalists offer monthly hikes at Cedar Creek Waterway, Lake Abilene

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Would your youth group be interested in a guided nature hike in the Abilene area? How about just as a family event?

Opportunities are available at least twice a month. The Big Country chapter of Texas Master Naturalists offers hikes along the Cedar Creek Waterway in Abilene and at Lake Abilene, each once a month.

The Lake Abilene hike is offered the first Saturday of most months; Cedar Creek hikes are on the third Saturday.

For the Lake Abilene hike, check in at the park headquarters by 9 a.m., then proceed as directed to the lake entrance. The hike usually lasts around two hours.

For Cedar Creek hikes, go to the trail entrance off of East South 11th Street. It is easily seen across an open field on the east side of the creek, with a large stone marker also designating the site. Again, expect about two hours' duration.

Be sure to wear appropriate shoes; open-toed shoes are strongly discouraged. Boots or walking/jogging shoes will be fine. Be prepared to encounter rocks or mud, especially if there has been recent precipitation.

Check the weather beforehand and dress appropriately. Water, snacks and a small first aid kit would be nice to have. Also binoculars and/or cameras.

Sometimes the hikes have a specific theme, but often they are more informal. You walk, enjoy looking at nature, and if you spot something that raises a question, you should get a knowledgeable answer.

There is no cost for the hikes and no pre-registration is required. Trails are well-marked and maintained, so if the hike is too long, you can always turn back. The trails are not designed

for wheelchair access, but someone so enabled could enjoy at least part of the journey, and with some help probably all of it.
