III. Officer and Committee Reports

A. President - Bruce Neville - President's Report - March 2016

During February, I solicited feedback from the membership through an anonymous survey and a retreat. The survey garnered 24 responses, and 24 members attended the retreat. Both methods provided plenty of frank and useful feedback, which I'm still studying. The raw results of the survey have been circulated to the Board and were posted at the retreat. A gross summary of both the survey and the retreat are:

What are we doing right? New member training; Meetings and speakers; AT opportunities; Leadership; Communication.

What do we need to change? Outreach/marketing to the public; Do away with food breaks; Management of natural areas; Recruiting, particularly youth and minorities; Communication; Outreach to local government; 501(c)3 status; Big Project; Funding.

Why are you not active? Cliques/don't fit in; Too busy; Events are not attractive (too birdy). What could be our Big Project? Butterfly/native garden; Working with children/schools; Lick Creek Park; Prairie restoration; Bird blind; Invasive removal; Mentor program

How can we be self-sufficient financially? Raise/tiered dues; Fundraisers; More members paying dues; Donations; Grants; Local sponsors; Native plant sale; Speaker series; Kids programming; Native walks.

Should we expand our geographic base? Yes (7); No (1, actually "hell, no"); Maybe (6). Considerations: Travel; Additional project opps; Fix our own problems first.

What else do you want the Board to know?

- "Right now, the Chapter is just existing."
- Need volunteer ops for those with limited mobility.
- People continue commitments because of personal connections.
- Some want to get involved, but are intimidated.
- Need a 5-year plan.
- Volunteer time is limited by family and work responsibilities.
- Members bond with and identify with their training cohort more than with the larger group.

As a follow-up to some of the short-term goals, I have sent out a survey requesting interests for an "interests" list. I have gotten 12 responses, and will compile those. I have spoken with the Membership Director about seeking a Mentorship Program Manager. I have spoken with the Advanced Training and Program Directors about a Field Trip Manager and where that person should report. I propose that we create a Board-level position for a Youth Programs Director and Committee. Mike Stecher has agreed to work through the process of filing for 501(c)3 status for the chapter.

I also propose that we limit general business meetings to quarterly (March, June, September, and December), immediately following the speaker, and do away with food at the monthly speaker meetings. This month will therefore be a general meeting, to approve the above changes.
