

All watersheds are interconnected, creating a land-water system that conveys water to its destination such as a river, lake, wetland, or estuary. In this seminar, learn how Texans use watersheds, natural watershed functions and the importance of watershed conservation. You will also learn how to become a water ambassador through the **Texas Waters Specialist** program.

The Texas Waters Specialist program informs and educates Texans about the most precious natural resource Texas possesses, its water. Many challenges face our state concerning water, particularly



Happy Anniversary, Buffalo Run Pocket

April 2022 marked the first anniversary of Missouri City's first and *only* coastal prairie pollinator pocket. The small "alligator tail" raised-bed demo garden at Buffalo Run Park, dedicated by the City April 2021, is a gift to the public and wildlife that keeps on giving.

Once the rains stopped and the standing puddles around the garden began to recede, it must have been odd seeing a couple of middle-aged ladies in rain boots, squatting on the ground, nets submersed in mucky water, giggling with plastic buckets in hand. Claire, a Missouri City resident visiting Buffalo Run Park for the first time walked by the strange weekday scene. She

stopped to see what these two Master Naturalists were up to.

"Whatever you're doing, it sure looks official," she told them. But Shannon and Mary weren't officially working (volunteering). They were just having fun rescuing frog tadpoles from certain doom, collecting them by the hundreds to be released elsewhere. They stopped to engage her and answer all her questions

regardless; it's what TMNs do.

Since the garden's installation in January 2021, Claire was not the only person to notice. Located by a playground and walking trails, the garden was often buzzing with kids alongside bees and butterflies all enjoying

the abundance of flowers there. Designed to be walked *into* rather than viewed from the outside in, entire families have

been seen
regularly picking
flowers, collecting
seeds to plant at
home, even hiding
Easter eggs among
the plants. The
beauty was
welcoming, not
just a purposeful
collection of coastal

prairie native grasses and flowers. (Read previous articles in *Courier* issues listed on page 9.)

Its first spring this year boasted many "weeds" popping up along the walking paths. Rather than pulling and yanking at them or spraying with herbicide, killing them, the understated wildflowers – "sprigs" – were ripe for transplanting elsewhere. Says

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TMNCPC Pauline Zinn, also a Missouri City resident:

"Buffalo Run prairie plants keep on giving! A few little sprigs blanket flower, pinkladies, partridge pea, spotted beebalm were rehomed to a beautiful 5-acre church property in Richmond where they are thriving in several maintained spaces. Buffalo Run also inspired another tiny pocket prairie on the same property, planted alongside very small plants from **Houston Audubon Natives** Nursery. Both new garden spaces have grown into beautiful spots for people, ready to serve the pollinators they attract."

One notable result has been the general absence of regular maintenance on the part of city staff OR volunteers.

Groundskeepers quickly caught on those native plants required a

different kind of work; they would mow around it, refrain from herbicide spray within. Meanwhile,

TMNs would occasionally trim and dropped seed heads or detritus as mulch while visiting and keep the frogfruit edge at looking tidy. Everyone was pleased with the results.

Aside from a severe drought year which required a rigorous watering until plant establishment, the annual spring mulching was the extent of any real labor done within a calendar year. Even that chore was quick work with only

three ladies; in a couple of hours, the job was done.

The garden's sustainability is topped only by its wildlife diversity – the very reason for its existence! A couple dozen carefully selected native plants have attracted more than 100 wildlife species, among them 23 species of *Lepidoptera* (butterflies and moths), 33 species of *Hymenoptera* (bees

and wasps), and 22 species of *Odonata* (dragonflies and damselflies) and *Diptera* (flies). Native wildflowers like vetch,

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pinkladies, and blue-eyed grasses, allowed to bloom alongside the installed plants, yielded a nearly year-round bloom.

Being a prairie pocket rather than a traditional garden, native grasses

both stabilized the soil for water retention and soil symbiosis (mycorrhizae!) and provided crucial cover for visiting wildlife. They exploded in blooming beauty late summer through fall, continued visual interest in dormancy through winter. Coastal prairie is a living, breathing

community; promoting prairie pockets like the one at Buffalo Run is crucial in advocating for an otherwise vanishing ecosystem.

The Buffalo Run Pollinator Prairie Pocket natives demo garden has checked all the boxes for education, outreach, and service on behalf of the

community and natural resources

 the TMN Mission. Here's hoping for new opportunities with Missouri City in the coming years.


