on prolonged hiking trips. It shows that even the most knowledgeable and seasoned outdoorsman can make a mistake while outside. He managed to live through them but did face his own demise with grit and, since he lived to be 74, learned from his own mistakes.



I want Mr. Muir's mishaps to be a wake-up call to our members and their loved ones. When you are out volunteering at the Refuge or anywhere, please be aware of your limitations. We live in such a special area that we sometimes forget the danger that can live under a rock or be beaming down on us. It is not with a nagging heart that I ask you to be safe and prepared, it is with a caring heart that I make this plea. You are nature and are even more important than the trees we love

and the wildflowers we enjoy. Be safe everyone! Thanks!!


<u>Now</u> - the team that worked on the flotilla would like to have your ideas on what to do with the funds

Trail of the Month - Starr Ranch

On May 20 from 9am to noon, Cypress Basin Texas Master Naturalists (CBTMN) will be hosting at beautiful Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge (CLNWR). Hosts will greet you at the Visitor Center with maps and info. Hosts will also be at the trail head of historic Starr Ranch Trail. There is a dock, a screened pavilion and bathroom. The trail is rated as easy. Guided walks of 1/2 - to 1.7 mile will be available.

There will also be a guided bicycle tour of about 8-10miles that will help you explore the refuge. (Meet up at 9am). Hikers should wear sturdy shoes. Cyclists should be prepared to ride on gravel roads and bring their own water. Admission is free.

Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge (CLNWR) is the former Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant at Karnack, TX. It has over 8000 acres



of beauty, diversity and historic interest. There are 5 established trails varying in lengths and habitats. You will see both how nature restores itself and how humans can help with restoring natural habitats. The auto tour route takes you to the various trailheads where you can see some of the historic structures from LHAAP and signage discussing both the history and interesting biology of the refuge. The auto tour route is also a great option for bicycling. Paddlers can access Goose Prairie from the dock at Starr Ranch.

Severe Weather Tips

The good news is that you can survive a tornado! Even on the western fringe of tornado alley, chances are you will never experience a direct hit by a tornado. However, being prepared is critical.

By following these simple guidelines, you can protect yourself and your family from nature's most violent storm.

No matter where you are, use these basic guidelines for tornado safety. Refer to other sections of this guide for more details on staying safe in specific locations and circumstances.

The most important things to remember are:

GET IN - If you are outside, get inside. If you're already inside, get as far into the middle of the building as possible.

GET DOWN - Get underground if possible. If you cannot, go to the lowest floor possible.

COVER UP - Flying and falling debris are a storm's number one killer. Use pillows, blankets, coats, helmets, etc to cover up and protect your head and body from flying debris.


