Help Celebrate 30 Years of Caddo Lake's Ramsar Designation

On October 23, 1993 Caddo Lake was designated a "Wetland of International Importance" by the Ramsar Convention. There are 2400 sites worldwide and 41 in the USA. Caddo Lake is the only one in Texas. http://www.ramsar.org

Friends of Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge along with Caddo Lake Institute are organizing a recognition day on Saturday, Oct 21. CBTMN has been asked to help, as have others. What: Walk trails at CLNWR, assess conditions to report to refuge management, move limbs as possible, trimming if needed, pick up trash

When: Saturday, Sep. 16

Meet: 8:00 CLNWR Visitor Center

Bring: If you have them bring gloves, hand loppers, rakes or hoes, weed eaters (hand held and rolling) BUT even if you are not up to using tools, you are providing a service by simply walking the trails and assessing conditions **AND** it is a good way to become more familiar with the beautiful trails at CLNWR. Many of our walks end up being just that....walking, enjoying nature, learning from each other.

The hot weather has really slowed us down but Sat the 16th should be great! Current prediction for the night before is temp dropping to 59 and the high for that Sat is to be mid 80's. The "new" trail (still a work in progress) near the headquarters and the parade ground will probably need a good bit of trimming. Ted Barrow and I will be taking a look at "privet" control.
