Texas Leads Global Nature Challenge — 150+ At-Risk Species Documented

Texans showed up in force for the 10th Annual City Nature Challenge (CNC), helping the state secure a place among the global leaders in community science. Participants across 14 Texas metro areas logged 342,913 observations, identifying 9,800+ species, including 150+ species of greatest conservation need—like the Texas horned lizard, Cascade Caverns salamander, cave myotis, and Texas tortoise.

Global Science, Local Action

The CNC, organized by the California Academy of Sciences and the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County, empowers people to document wild plants, animals, and fungi using the free iNaturalist app.

In 2025, the CNC engaged 102,945 participants from 669 cities across 62 countries, generating 3.3 million observations and identifying 73,765 species, including over 3,300 rare or threatened species. Texas alone made up 10% of the global total.

Top-Ranked Texas Cities

- San Antonio Metro: #2 in both observations and species
- Dallas/Fort Worth: #4 in observations, #6 in species
- Four Texas cities ranked in the global top 15

This marks the fourth year in a row Texas cities placed in the global top 10, showing the state's strong commitment to conservation and public engagement.

Why Citizen Science Matters

Citizen scientists help fill critical gaps in biodiversity data. Their observations:

- Reveal species' ranges and behavior
- Identify environmental threats
- Inform habitat and wildlife protections

According to Texas Nature Trackers, a TPWD program that supports CNC in Texas, this data is vital for guiding conservation efforts.

Get Involved Year-Round

You don't have to wait for next year's CNC to make an impact:

1. Download iNaturalist
2. Photograph wild plants and animals
3. Upload your observations

Whether you're exploring a park, backyard, or schoolyard, your sightings help scientists and conservationists protect Texas wildlife.
