FIGHT LIGHT POLLUTION

****Explore the Stars and Fight Light Pollution: The Globe at Night Campaign****

The **Globe at Night** campaign is a global citizen science initiative inviting people of all ages to measure and record the brightness of the night sky in their local areas. This data helps scientists assess light pollution levels and understand its impact on wildlife, ecosystems, and human health. As urbanization grows, so does light pollution, dimming the stars and affecting natural cycles. By participating, you can help identify regions where light pollution is severe and support efforts to preserve dark skies.

****How to Participate****

1. ****Choose a Date****: The next observation window is November 24 to December 3, 2024. Observing during a specific period ensures consistency in the data.
2. ****Locate a Dark Spot****: Find an area with minimal artificial light, such as a park, backyard, or rural spot. Let your eyes adjust to the darkness for about 10 minutes.
3. ****Observe the Stars****: Look up at the constellation indicated on the **Globe at Night** website (often Orion in the Northern Hemisphere). Count the stars you see and note the clarity.
4. ****Submit Your Observation****: Go to the **Globe at Night** website or use their app to log your observations. They provide easy-to-use sky charts for reference.

By contributing, you join a global effort to protect our night skies and promote awareness about light pollution.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The *Christmas Bird Count* (CBC), running from December 14 to January 5 each year, is a wonderful citizen science event hosted by the National Audubon Society. This 120-year tradition invites people of all skill levels to help document bird populations across North America. The data collected aids scientists in monitoring bird populations and understanding environmental health.

Participating is easy and open to everyone! Begin by locating a local Audubon chapter or CBC coordinator to join a counting group in a designated area known as a “count circle.” These circles cover various bird habitats and are led by experienced birders who guide participants in identifying and counting local bird species.

Each count typically lasts a full day, during which volunteers note every bird species and individual they see. The compiled data provides invaluable insights into species trends and migratory patterns. By participating, you contribute directly to bird conservation while enjoying a rewarding outdoor experience.

THANKFUL FOR TEXAS TURKEYS

Native to Texas, the Rio Grande wild turkey (*Meleagris gallopavo intermedia*) thrives across the state, including the woodlands and rolling hills of northeast Texas. In this region, their populations have been successfully reintroduced and managed, allowing them to flourish in forests, agricultural lands, and riparian areas. Recognizable by their bronze-green iridescent feathers, these turkeys roost in trees and forage for insects, seeds, and berries. Conservation and habitat restoration efforts have ensured that they remain an important part of the ecosystem in northeast Texas.
