If you have **not recertified for 2025 yet**, you still have time! Hours may be earned up until Dec. 31. Please log any 2025 hours in VMS soon, but definitely by Jan. 10.

Recording Your Hours in VMS – Things stressed at the TMN Annual Meeting:

- You MUST write something in the Describe Your Service box! Auditors will not allow it to be used for grants if it is blank or doesn't have enough information.
- Keep in mind Who, What, When, Where, and Why when logging your entries.
 - --**Who** did you do the work for? (Who sponsored the event?) Sometimes the sponsor is in the title of the opportunity, so you don't have to repeat it in the description.
 - --What did you do? This doesn't have to be detailed, but enough to tell us what you did that allows you to be credited with hours.
- --When is taken care of by the date you had to put on the form.
 - --Where did you do the work? (or attend the meeting or program) We don't need the specific address. Or was it virtual?
 - -- Why doesn't always apply. If you are doing work to prepare a presentation you are going to give, be sure to say what that presentation is about and where it will be used.
- Avoid Acronyms!! Acceptable ones are TMN, TPWD, and pretty much nothing else. You know what they mean, but I may not, and the auditors might not!
- Citizen Science (other) work must be tied to a specific project, and you need to name the project plus tell what you did, etc.
- If the name and/or location of the project is in the opportunity title, you don't have to repeat it in the description. If it's something generic like Adopt-A-Highway, though, you need to say where you did the work.

• If you add time for travel to and from the site, you don't have to specify how much of your time is travel. But you do have to add "plus travel" to your description.

Please ask me if you are unsure of how to log something. I'd rather tell you in advance than write you an email later on how to correct your entry.

Thank you for recording your hours! Each volunteer hour that is approved by the auditors is used to qualify for federal grants of over \$23 for our sponsoring agencies.


Election of New Officers at November Chapter Meeting

Daniel Lewis was a forester with the Texas A&M Forest Service until he retired a few years ago. He became a member in 2008, and since his retirement, he's been able to be more active in our chapter. Why did you decide to join Master Naturalists initially?


Ecology to each new chapter class, which includes a forest walk. I always enjoy education projects working with kids and adults that focus on trees, brush management and invasive species control.

TMN GLC and Keep Columbus Beautiful Team Up at Adopt-a-Highway Columbus

Last April, TMN GLC approached Columbus Garden Club, sponsor of Keep Columbus Beautiful, to join its Trash Off Day held annually on the first Saturday in April. GLC held two events in one that day. GLC members participated in a riverside cleanup under the north and south ends of the US Business 71 bridge, referred to often as "North Bridge". They also did an in-river canoe trash pickup trip through the Columbus Loop on the Colorado River, a 6.5-mile paddling trail that winds from the boat launch under North Bridge to Beason's Crossing Park.

Following that successful joint endeavor that removed a trailer-load of trash from shore and river, the TMN group approached Keep Columbus Beautiful, to team up again.

On Wednesday, November 5, 2025, an in-water clean-up crew of 4 (led by Chuck Babb and Tayvis Dunnahoe) paddled the river picking up trash along and in the river.

On-shore, a TMN GLC team (led by Wanda Anglin) and the Keep Columbus Beautiful committee chair, Marian Schonenberg, picked up trash. They covered the north end of TMN's new Adopt-a-Highway site in Columbus at the boat ramp entrance off US Bus 71 down to the railroad tracks at Crockett. The site actually extends down to the block where Maria's Restaurant and Columbus Hometown Pharmacy are, but the massive amounts of trash under the south side of the bridge took more time than hoped so a small team plans to clean the area from the railroad to the south end of the site later this month.

Twelve bags of trash with some big pieces such as a toilet, furniture pieces, fallen road signs, pop-up tent-frame, small fridge door, and some unusual finds including 2 burner phones, 2 unshot shells, and a handmade frog gig were collected. A bag of aluminum cans was recycled.

The Adopt-a-Highway shore cleanup crew included Wanda Anglin, Linda Esco, Trey Granger, Jacquie and John Pritchard, Dottie Schoeneberg, as well as the Columbus Garden Club Keep Columbus Beautiful committee chair, Marian Schonenberg and Wanda's

husband, Frank Piper.

Mark your calendars! TMN and the Garden Club will be teaming up again with a joint project on Saturday, April 4, 2026, for Keep Columbus Beautiful Trash Off Day.
