



Congratulations to the Class of 2022!

Our Chapter welcomes our new members and we look forward to serving and learning with them in the coming year. Seventeen completed the course with seven having all class requirements complete and two also earning their initial certification.

CHAPTER BUSINESS

A new Memorial Policy for deceased Master Naturalists was approved by the GMN board and chapter members in November 2022. Ideas were researched and recommended by members Nancy Masterson, Liz Romero, Sandi Wheeler and Kathy Pearson. They collected suggestions from 18 organizations, other chapters and from our own members. Three active Master Naturalists have died since our chapter was formed; Joel Tanner certified in 2018 and died in 2019. Betty Hughes, certified in 2014 and died in 2019 and David Pearson, certified in 2020 and passed away in 2021.

The procedures will honor the memory of naturalists who were current members of our Guadalupe chapter at year of their death and were once certified by our Guadalupe chapter. The memorial efforts will include the late member's family, chapter members, members-in-training and our state office of Texas Master Naturalists.

The Memorial Policy has three main areas; announcements, scholarships, and donations. The board vice-president is charged with overseeing the matter.

To inform our members and state organization, the Board will send a sympathy card to the family, hold a Moment of Silence at next chapter meeting, publish news of the death with a photo, obituary and, if timely, information on upcoming services in our chapter newsletter and send to our state office. The website manager will add a <u>In Memorial</u> tab to our site to post names and photos. The chapter will also send news of the death to the state office with a photo, Chapter name and area of interest for the memorial slide show at each fall's annual conference.

The Treasurer will create a Memorial Fund in the chapter budget and allocate \$150 per year in it. Each memorial will include a \$100 donation into the TMN Endowment Fund. We will also encourage individual donations into the TMN Endowment. See <u>https://masternaturalistendowment.org</u> to make a donation. Follow the website sample on the Donate Now link. The Texas A&M Foundation manages the fund, which began in 2018. The fund recently topped \$100,000.

The Class Committee will select a deserving member-in-training to receive a partial scholarship (\$50) in the next class for each member who passed. We will create a <u>In Memory of</u> bookplate for their text book.

In 2023, the chapter will sponsor a student's textbook (\$50) and donate \$100 to the TMN Endowed Fund in Memory of Joel Tanner. In 2024, the chapter will sponsor a student's textbook and donate to the TMN Endowed Fund in Memory of Betty Hughes. In 2025, sponsor a student's textbook and donate to the TMN Endowed Fund in Memory of David Pearson.

2023 Training Class Mentor Program

A Mentor program for next year's training class is in the developmental stages. The information below is taken from the state Chapter Management and Operations Protocols. But, don't let that massive text discourage you! The primary overall responsibility is to "adopt" a new trainee and help them as needed to complete their program and become certified. In other words, become a FRIEND to the trainee! What's more fun than adding new friends? Retention of new trainees is an issue for every Chapter and having a buddy to rely on for encouragement will go a long way in the development of new Master Naturalists. More details will come in the Spring.

A3.3 Mentor Responsibilities – Following is a list of suggested responsibilities for mentors.

A3.3.1 Mentors will attend a meeting of mentors scheduled and convened by the membership or initial training directors in advance of the beginning of the Initial Training course, as described in A3.2.

A3.3.2 Each mentor may be assigned one or more Members-in-Training, generally within their geographical area, and will be provided a copy of the enrollment application for each.

A3.3.3 Mentors should:

a. Contact their assigned Member-in-Training by phone and set up a physical meeting to deliver the class materials. Try to have all materials in the hands of the Member-in-Training prior to the new class reception/orientation date or start of classes.

b. Review the textbook and class manual, stressing reading assignments prior to each class.

c. Provide personal contact information and review the local chapter list of contacts and where the information can be found.

d. Inform the Member-in-Training of programs available such as chapter meetings, other naturalist related organization programs, the TMN Annual Meeting, or an event in the immediate area.

e. Talk to the Member-in-Training about the mentor's experience as a Texas Master Naturalist and volunteer projects with which the mentor is involved.

f. Provide a class roster.

g. Review procedures for making up a missed class or field trip [See 4.1.3].

h. Provide information on the class reception/orientation, including time, date, and location; plan to carpool with them or meet them at the event.

i. Help the Member-in-Training to develop a 2-minute introduction they can give at the orientation/reception/first class.

j. Plan to attend one or more classes with the Member-in-Training, if possible; coordinate attendance permission with the training director, as space may be limited.

k. Emphasize the commitment and requirement of volunteering and advanced training and provide information about how and when to report those hours in VMS.

I. Meet often throughout the Initial Training period with the Member-in-Training to answer questions, help solve problems, encourage, and to help ensure eventual certification of the Member-in-Training.

m. Be aware of reasons a Member-in-Training falls behind in class, drops out of the class, fails to eventually certify, or fails to remain engaged in the organization. The mentor should report such information to the training director, membership director or board as appropriate.

n. Develop a lasting relationship with the assigned new member that continues following the training class and should continue to provide guidance and assistance to help ensure the eventual certification of the Member-in-Training. Special attention should be focused on those new members who have not completed their initial certification or otherwise have not become engaged in chapter volunteer activities.
