Calling All Witches For Herbology

Description: Our Guadalupe Master Naturalists chapter is invited to present our Herbology program to the chapter meeting of Guadalupe Master Gardeners. We created this program in 2018 for the Seguin Public Library's Harry Potter family day. To create the magical world of Hogwarts' Herbology, we used the ethnobotany materials from our Early Texans Discovery series, by simply grouping them into "spells." We taught the traditional uses of native plants by the Tonkawa Native American people and early settlers. It was repeated in 2019 and 2022.














Some of the magical potions we present are Color Spells (walnut black dye, agarita yellow and cochineal red), Medicine Spells (echinea, barbados cherry, prickly ash and yaupon holly), Poison Spells (mountain laurel beans, acorns, lantana and mistletoe), Smelly Spells (Mexican oregano, wild onions, cedar and sage), and Touchy Spells (Mexican buckeye, anaqua, yucca and sotol.)

However, the October presentation to Master Gardeners will be the first time we give the Herbology program to a roomful of 50-75 adults. The leader, Nancy Masterson, has worked with the MG program chair to plan a line-up of draped tables with a microphone passed along for 8-minute individual presentations – all in witchy/warlock character, of course. We need 5-8 volunteers to sign up and there will be a planning meeting in October. Watch for the Signup Genius to join in the fun. Get excited for our **Texas Master Naturalist 2023 Annual Meeting** – to be held **Thursday, October 12th through Sunday, October 15th** this year at the southernmost point of the South Texas Plains ecoregion, surrounded by mesquite and prickly pear brush country in **McAllen, Texas**.

There are 20 Field Trips and over 100 seminar sessions along with an all-day Field Trip to the East Foundation's El Sauz Ranch to view the Annular Solar Eclipse, eat lunch, listen to speakers, and participate in field-based advanced training sessions. The El Sauz Ranch hosts a unique diversity of landscapes and land management practices with active sand dunes, thornscrub brush, ocelots, an active cattle herd, university research projects, burn management plans, and so much more.

The Texas Master Naturalist Annual Meeting provides an opportunity for the Texas Master Naturalist volunteers from around the state to gather, participate in hands-on educational seminars, and receive all their Advanced Training requirements for the

year in one weekend. It's also an opportunity for program participants and supporters to network, share new ideas, and to learn from chapters in different regions of the state.

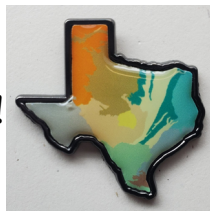

IS IT DROUGHT OR IS IT DROUTH?

I looked it up, you can pronounce it both ways; they both mean the same thing.

It's been a dry year, especially since Memorial Day. So, I began to wonder, are we in a drought or just a dry spell?

From my Essentials of Meteorology book, I learn that a drought "refers to a period of abnormally dry weather that produces a number of negative consequences, such as crop damage or an adverse impact on a community's water supply." It is more than a dry spell. I might add that in this part of Texas, crops include grass, grazing and cattle production. So, a drought is an abnormally long dry spell that will often disrupt our cattle and feed industries.

Of course, one man's drought is another man's rainforest. In Arizona, they think Central Texas droughts are wet spells. So, it all depends on what you are used to and what you expect. In Central Texas, we like about 35 inches of rain per year, spread out evenly, although I don't remember ever having a year exactly like that.

Until the recent rains of a couple of weeks ago, cattlemen in DeWitt County were selling off their stocks, because of lack of grazing and a poor hay supply. This causes local perturbations in the cattle market, both short and intermediate term, making it difficult for ranchers to predict the cattle market for the next year or so.

The US Drought Monitor

How do we know if we are in a drought, other than noticing that crunching sound when walking across our lawn?

A great source of weather and drought data is found at the website [//droughtmonitor.unl.edu](http://droughtmonitor.unl.edu). This website contains a set of attractive, vividly illustrated maps which tell you everything you want to know about (1) drought impacts (2) crop bulletins, (3) the Palmer Drought Severity Index (4) percent of normal rainfall (5) soil moisture (6) mountain snowpack (especially important for DeWitt and Guadalupe Counties) and a whole series of other helpful maps. These maps are updated weekly. They cover the entire continental United States.

For example, a look at the Palmer Drought Severity Index tells us that we, here in Central Texas, as of Sept 23, 2023, are in a Severe Drought (-3.0 to -3.9 on the scale). Extreme drought is -4.0 or lower, so we are getting close unless we get some significant rain.

I didn't look up how they come up with these various Index Numbers. I'm guessing the algorithm is complicated, and even if I learned it, I would forget it by next week, anyway.

I also checked the Topsoil Moisture figures. As you would expect, our topsoil is Very Dry (>50%) by their measure. We are also dryer than the 5 Year Mean and the 10 Year Mean.

This site is produced through a partnership with the National Drought Mitigation Center, the USDA, NOAA, and interestingly enough, they use input from Cocorahs Volunteers. So now you know that all that volunteer time you put in reading your rain gauge has not gone unappreciated.
