Toast to Texas - Celebrating the Texas Declaration of Independence

Description: Seguin will honor the past by telling the story of Texas and how it won its Independence from Mexico on March 2, 1836. This year the event will be in Central Park, and includes a number of other local organizations

including our Master Naturalist chapter. It is scheduled to start at 11:00 and wrap up mid-afternoon. There is a program at 1:30 and the actual toast is at 2:00. The Daughters of the Republic of Texas and the City of Seguin Parks and Recreation Department are the sponsors.

Much of the "living off the land" talking points used in the current Discovery series program would have applied to the earliest settlers from Europe as well as the Native Americans. Description: Join the Park West Forest Restoration Team meeting every Thursday. We have a 48 acre park to reclaim from invasive ligustrum and chinaberry, so dress for outdoor work and bring water and tools. Our First Forest area, begun by Class #1 in 2014, is looking wonderful - like a true Texas forest of oaks, cedar elms, and pecans. If you're not ready to work, and just want to take a look, bring the team some yummies for the 10 AM water break.

Wear: Long sleeves, long pants, hat, closed-toe shoes and work gloves. **Bring:** Drinking water; BYO Tools - lopping shears, small saws, pruners.

Why: When bamboo, ligustrum and other invasive plants dominate the forest, Texas oaks, pecans and cedar elms are starved by the alien plants. If nothing is done to remove the foreign invaders, our native forest with all its botanical diversity, birds, wildlife and botanical beauty will be lost.

Acoustic Bat Monitoring

Starting in May 2024 TPWD Texas Nature Trackers will be collecting data through acoustic monitoring to provide a better understanding of the distribution of more than 30 species of bats across Texas. They are asking Texas Master Naturalist Chapters to assist in this community science effort. There are multiple ways to participate including collecting acoustic data on private and public lands using TPWD provided acoustic monitors and helping in the storage and analysis of the collected data. The TPWD provided acoustic monitor is placed in the designated location on a Monday and retrieved again the following Friday. It only needs to be done once annually in the April to June time frame for each location. Because we will only have one or two acoustic monitors we will be coordinating the transfer of the monitors to each location during the monitoring period. Currently we have chapter members volunteering to monitor bats at Crescent Bend Nature Park, Palmetto State Park, and Warbler Woods Bird Sanctuary but we can add other locations across our region.

City Nature Challenge 2024

Master Naturalists, let's do this! City Nature Challenge 2024 is coming this April 26-29. The challenge started as a friendly competition between San Fransisco and Los Angeles in 2016. The goal was for citizen science teams in these rival California cities to document local wildlife. Los Angeles area won that first contest with 10,352 observations, 1,601 species and 574 participants. Now the challenge has spread across the world! The CNC 2023 winner was the city of La Paz, Bolivia.

How can San Antonio area Master Naturalists participate in City Nature Challenge? Download the iNaturalist app, take photos or record sounds of local nature on April 26-29, then upload your photos/sounds into iNaturalist by May 5. It's that easy! There are **12 counties** included in the San Antonio Metro Area, so use City Nature Challenge as a reason to explore. These counties are Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Gillespie, Goliad, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, Medina and Wilson counties.

Our goal is to pass the Dallas and Houston areas in iNaturalist observations during April 26-29! We edged out the Austin area during City Nature Challenge 2023. A big THANK YOU to everyone who helped make that happen last year.



Lee will discuss the importance of native milkweeds, share photos showing a close look at some of the many creatures interconnected with milkweed, and provide tips on how to care for milkweed in your landscape.

Lee Marlowe is a restoration ecologist with over 20 years of professional experience working in the field of ecological restoration and natural resource management including sustainable landscape practices and applications.
