



Volunteer Opportunities by Amy Sharp

The Lindheimer Projects Committee highlights volunteer opportunities in the Lindheimer Texas Master Naturalists newsletter! Sites are shared quarterly to inform the LMN about the breadth of ways to support our community.

<u>BLANCO STATE PARK</u> Blanco SP is a small state park with swimming and fishing, wildlife viewing, hiking, and short term and weekend

camping. The new park interpreter is offering more park programs and activities and two Texas Master Naturalists chapters are supporting this effort – the Highland Lakes Chapter and the Lindheimer Chapter. tpwd.texas.gov/state-parks/blanco

WHAT/WHEN

- Site Work 2nd Thursday of each month is a River bank cleanup and access project. Blanco SP is expanding or opening up more areas to access the two river sections for fishing and swimming. Done along with the park ranger staff. (About 2-3 hours weather dependent.)
- Education/Outreach -
 - 2nd <u>Saturday</u> of each month will be a Fishing 101 program there are two Angler Ed specialists leading this and support is needed for participants. (About 2 hours)
 - 4th <u>Saturday</u> is planned for an educational discovery presentation by a Master Naturalist new topics to be planned for each month. (1–2 hours, MN choice.)

Blanco SP has a goal of providing 'Homeschooling in the Park'. This project would provide
education on 'Naturalist' topics and is in progress. Master Naturalists are great candidates to assist
in this effort.

Body Language of Wasps

Wasp body language is a complex system of signals that includes chemical signals, body language, vibrations, and visual signals. These signals are used to communicate various messages within the wasp colony, such as danger, food, and social hierarchy. Here are some key points about wasp body language:

- **Pheromones**: Chemical signals that transmit messages and coordinate activities within the colony. (1)
- **Body Language**: Includes raised wings, bent antennae, and body posture to signal aggression or submission. (1)
- Visual Signals: Such as dances to communicate food locations or nesting sites. (1)
- Vibrations and Sounds: Used to share information and signal danger. (1)
- Aggressive Postures: Raised wings, bent antennae, and body posture to indicate readiness to defend the nest. (2)



Join us on Thursday, March 20, 2025 at 5:45 to hear Doug Dalglish on "Foraging in Central Texas." Doug writes: "Throughout most of human existence, people have been nourished and sustained by the plants around them. In the modern world, we've lost this direct connection to nature. Foraging is more than collecting food from the wild.

Foraging is a way of connecting us to the rhythms of nature and reconnecting us to our own history."

Doug studied electrical engineering at Texas A&M, then made a career change to become a Presbyterian minister. Part of his work over the last 25 years has been land management over several church-owned properties in central and south Texas.

Doug is a founding member of the Lindheimer Master Natu Chapter and has been involved with the chapter since 2001.

Monthly Chapter Meeting

Thursday, June 19, 2025 at 5:45 pm

In this one-hour session, we'll discuss aquifer types, current Comal County water table levels, our two types of aquifers, common misconceptions about aquifers, rates at which groundwater moves through an aquifer, depletion and replenishment rates, and natural filtration. We'll then learn how to capture rain for potable or irrigation purposes. We'll discuss understanding rainwater needs, storing rainwater, assessing a rainwater collection area, filtering leaves & debris, water filtration, monitoring the water level, and caring for your system.





Speaker Bio:

A retired career Matine captain and a retired 25-year university professor of statutes and research from the University of Redland. Dr. Larry Sunn comunity free of charge with area residents interested in the instruction yeters. Dr. Sunn severed his community as a member of Comal Timity Coundquites Conservation Delarker's Beaul of Drectors from 2015 to 2025, he is cutrently a director on the board of The Confine an orthopodic sungery training facility, and he is on the board of directors of the Bulentle Community Path Association. He and his wife of 63 years lave lived on the west side of Bulentle for the part 20 years. Informed early in his life that he could become vehicler he winted to become, Dr. Sunn chooses to be a Supreme Commander.



Contributing to Citizen Science: /Naturalist.org

"Citizen" Science is the participation of non-scientists in scientific research. As naturalists, many of us already participate in community science projects that contribute to the body of scientific knowledge about plants, animals & insects: butterfly surveys, bird counts, plant identification. And we take pictures – LOTS of pictures! Each picture is an observation and represents an opportunity to increase the scientific knowledge of what, where & when. One of the largest community science projects is iNaturalist, a world-wide, on-line database of observations provided by community scientists like Master Naturalists. "If enough people

recorded their observations, it would be like a living record of life on

Earth that scientists and land managers could use to monitor changes in biodiversity, and that *anyone* could use to learn more about nature."
