

Winter Seed Sowing

Last winter, someone had explained the process of Winter Seed Sowing, and it peaked my interest. So, when I came across this infographic on Facebook, I thought I would share some information about it in case anyone else is interested in starting seeds in this manner.

Benefits to Winter Seed Sowing:

- Inexpensive
- Recycle/Repurpose Containers (Plastic jugs, Soda bottles, Food containers with clear lids)
- Don't Need Specialized Lights/Heat Mats
- Not Time Consuming
- Don't Need to "Harden Off" Plants

Note: Most of the articles agree that the ideal time to sow is Jan-Feb.



Supplies Needed:

- Potting SoilSeeds
- Clear plastic containers
- Screwdriver or old knife
- Duct tape
- Scissors
- Paint Pen & Labels

choosing seed varieties:


- Parsley

***Once seeds germinate, check often. As they grow they will need a larger opening in container to provide better air circulation.

<u>January</u>

- January 1: Venus visible in the morning sky Jupiter brightest "star" at night in southeast sky Saturn visible in Aquarius constellation
- January 4: Quadrantids Meteor Shower
- January 13-14: Moon & Saturn are "dancing" together
- January 18: Conjunction of Moon & Jupiter
- January 25: Full Moon (Wolf Moon)
- January 27: Mars & Mercury seen together in morning sky
 - <u>February</u>
- February 14: Jupiter & Moon seen together
- February 20-24: Conjunction of Mars & Venus
- February 24: Full Moon (Snow Moon)
- Orion Constellation visible this month
- Sirius in the Big Dipper Constellation is the brightest star this month
- Winter Triangle visible: Procyon (in Little Dipper), Sirius, and Betelgeuse

March

- March 10-31: Mercury visible in the evening sky
- March 17-31: Saturn visible in the morning sky
- March 25: Full Moon (Worm Moon)
- Jupiter visible at night during the whole month
- Draco Constellation is visible
- The tiara of the Corona Borealis (Northern Crown) is visible


