Buzz & Bloom Garden

Congratulations, Longleaf Ridge fellow Master Naturalists!!! We've been awarded the \$4,000 HEB grant for the pollinator garden in Jasper. Thanks to help from Master Gardeners and the Jasper Hospital District, we were able to secure the rights to the plot of land and submit the grant in June. The HEB grant was awarded through our partners at Texas Park and Wildlife. HEB awards grants up to \$4,000 to TXMN chapters throughout the state, but this is a first for East Texas.

The garden will be located on Marvin Hancock Dr., just north of the Children's Clinic and across from the hospital's emergency helipad and first responders' newly competed residence. The garden design features a fountain pond, paths, interpretative signage, bee and bat houses, and more. It will have engaging signage and games for children such as hopscotch, tic-tac-toe, and "wacky facts" about pollinators and their importance to us.

All Hands on Deck!

We need all hands to make this garden a reality. We plan to break ground this month. The Hospital District will be installing electric and water and the pond. We plan to purchase plants and get them in the ground soon.

<u>Donate/find plants</u>: Several volunteers are busy trying to locate a reliable source for the plants on our list, and they can use some help. We prefer plants rather than seeds, and we must use the species that were submitted in the application. If you didn't receive the plant list, and would like to help locate them, contact Laura Clark at 409-594-0821.

<u>Design and Plant</u>: Julia McCormick is doing a soil survey. Then, we will haul in mulch and the donated boulders and lay out the design for the beds and paths. We hope that the hospital district is able to get water to the site so we can start planting as early as November for any plants we can secure by then. The balance of planting will be done in the Spring. We will be planning work days so please watch your email for these dates.

<u>Woodcrafting</u>: We can also use our woodcraft experts to create benches and the bee and bat houses for our garden. Please let Anne Davis (281-685-6029) know if you are able to craft some of these. See the attached photos for some ideas.




July 8, 2025

September 9, 2025



News from Texas Black Bear Alliance

A BLACK BEAR HAS BEEN CONFIRMED IN EAST TEXAS.

TBBA is excited to share the news that Texas Parks and Wildlife has confirmed a black bear traveling through East Texas in August. The bear has been spotted in Anderson, Cherokee, Rusk, and Panola counties. The bear was captured on game trail cameras and even left behind footprints in the Mud Creek area near Ponta.



MERICAN BEAUTYBERRY

(Callicarpa americana)

It's about that time of year where we will begin seeing Beautyberries ripening. Some areas are already seeing the bright purple berries, however, they usually don't ripen on my place until around October, so I probably have a couple more weeks. However, I'll have to fight the birds to gather these bright berries (wildlife love these berries!). This plant was one of the first plants I learned to forage here in Southeast Texas. They have a very distinctive pattern in the way the berries grow.



The berries are not great for eating by themselves as they are labeled as "slightly astringent." I don't think they have much flavor, but they make a beautiful jelly.

Supposedly, Beautyberry has some medicinal properties, but I do not have firsthand experience with this. From what I read, the Native Americans used to use the roots in a tea to treat stomach ailments, a tea from the roots and berries to treat colic, they used a tea from the roots and leaves in sweat houses to treat fevers and malaria. It also appears that the leaves have been used as a mosquito repellent. I believe some studies have even been done on its anti-cancer properties.

Beautyberry Jelly

6 c. berries

8 c. water

Boil for approximately 20 minutes, mash

berries & strain. Then, use

4 cups juice

5.5 cups sugar

1 box pectin

2 Tbsp lemon juice


