What is mimicry?

Mimicry is when one species looks like another to gain a survival advantage.

In Batesian mimicry a harmless species looks like a lethal species.

In Mullerian mimicry 2 or more harmful species evolve to look like each other to fool common predators.

Camouflage is considered a related form of mimicry—for example the Southern bolas spider looks like bird poop!





Insects are particularly skilled mimics!

Aposematism is the use of colors to warn that a living thing may be venomous, poisonous or otherwise dangerous.

Milk snakes and coral snakes are an example of aposematic mimicry.






As you walk, can you find any examples of insects mimicking each other?
