



Randolph Watson Rockets to 4,000 Hours of Service

After the chapter held a meeting about Seabourne Creek Nature Park (SCNP) early 2023, little did we know that it would result in a valuable asset to our signature project: Randolph Watson, Class of Fall 2022, volunteered to be co-director of SCNP with Jerry Trenta.

After many years with Jerry as the sole director at SCNP, our chapter's signature project, the many moving parts and dozens of regular volunteers were growing and expanding; it would only benefit from a strengthened co-leadership.

Today, Randolph participates in several areas of the park, especially the prairie and the arboretum. He communicates at least weekly on Slack about what is being undertaken at the park, and distributes a volunteer SignUp Genius to regularly coordinate volunteers with

activities.

He is a talented photographer, documenting visually what is happening there, journaling progress. He is always friendly and readily available for volunteers who want to discuss their ideas and stewardship needs for their areas at the park.

Seabourne's team leaders depend on Randolph for guidance and support. Jerry Trenta, Co-Director of SCNP, noted, "Randolph has become the heart of the Seabourne Project. The achievements of the Chapter at Seabourne

over the last two years have been extraordinary and are directly attributed to Randolph's leadership."

Shree Nath, co-lead of SCNP Pollinator Pocket Prairie stated that Randolph is "dedicated, driven and passionate about the environment." Her co-lead, Fran Wilcox, added "he is very organized and a natural at project management."

Monica Taylor, Class of Spring 2023, has worked with Randolph for several years at Houston SPCA Wildlife Center of Texas. She adds:

"For over a decade, he has helped rehabilitate wildlife and educate the public about peaceful coexistence with wildlife. He works countless hours in building relationships with these wildlife education ambassadors.

"Like most volunteers Randolph cleans, feeds, and provides care for wildlife in need throughout the year and can be found regularly behind the microscope reading sample slides or preparing medications. He has worked with all types of wildlife, his favorite being the raptors, and while he cares for hawks, falcons, and eagles *onsite*, he regularly releases many of them *offsite*.

"When you see Randolph at an event, it's clear that he's passionate about wildlife and helping people learn how to coexist with them. During 2025, he led the team in appearances — more than 65 outreach events."

Guest Article: SPLASh Rabbs Bayou Cleanup Helps More than Texas Wildlife and Waters

SPLASh teamed up with H-E-B Our Texas Our Future, the Houston Zoo, and TMN Coastal Prairie Chapter members Jo Cosbey and Diane Johnston to host a trash cleanup along Rabbs Bayou in Richmond, Texas on November 15, 2025.

Approximately 28 volunteers removed **312 pounds of trash** from the environment. An additional **45 electronic devices** — 10 pounds worth — were collected as e-waste recycling.

Because of these efforts, we not only prevented trash and electronics from polluting water and soil and affecting our local wildlife. The electronic waste recycling program also raised funds for Houston Zoo's wildlife-saving partner in the Congo Basin of Africa who works directly with endangered gorillas.

The Remote Challenge: Igniting a Volunteer Spark for Attwater Prairie-Chicken NWR

Attwater Prairie-Chicken National Wildlife Refuge (APCNWR)

located about 60 miles west of Houston near Eagle Lake, Texas, is a critical sanctuary for one of the most endangered birds in North America: Attwater's prairie-chicken. This 10,000+ acre refuge preserves one of the largest remaining tracts of native coastal prairie, providing essential habitat for this ground-dwelling grouse and countless other species. It is further enveloped by privately owned ranches, forming a protective bubble — a true sanctuary of refuge. APCNWR stands as an authentic haven.

While the isolation of APCNWR is one of the best things about it, that remoteness has long posed challenges for recruiting volunteers. This leaves the small refuge staff unsupported and struggling to manage habitat restoration, invasive species control, APC monitoring, and public outreach.

Despite its proximity to Houston, an area with millions of potential volunteers, the refuge faces significant challenges in building and sustaining a robust volunteer base. This is because there are many urban conservation opportunities closer to home for volunteers to latch on to.

Even TMN [Gideon Lincecum Chapter](#) (TMNGLC) whose territory embraces APCNWR, counts most members an hour or more in distance. Building a robust volunteer base from their own TMNGLC members is just not a realistic idea; APCNWR is remote for them too.

Recognizing these difficulties, our chapter stepped forward to beat the drum, sound the call for help, and committed to help build a solid volunteer base. The chapter proposed an idea to form a reliable crew drawn from surrounding TMN chapters and beyond. Recruit just a handful from each group, and a committed force could emerge.

After many meetings and emails between U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), APCNWR, Gideon Lincecum Chapter, Friends of Attwater, and Coastal Prairie Chapter, a collaboration was established.

The idea is simple yet effective: a dedicated group of volunteers meets every Friday morning from 8 AM to noon to assist refuge staff with hands-on tasks. Activities include habitat management projects, planting native grasses, and maintaining trails, as well as outreach efforts like leading tours, staffing the Visitor Center, or supporting

real-time access to important information, share photos, and more. It has helped form a cohesive and effective group that continues to grow.

This partnership exemplifies how community-driven initiatives can bridge gaps in public land management. By actively recruiting from within and outside its membership, and establishing a fixed weekly workday, the TMN Coastal Prairie Chapter has laid a foundation for a strong volunteer team to grow and expand. Volunteers are needed to ensure the long-term health of the refuge's fragile prairie ecosystem — and the survival of the iconic Attwater's prairie-chicken. Interested

our chapter, we have been able to invite refuge staff, [Friends of Attwater](#) and TMNGLC members to join for the sharing of information about the volunteer opportunities and news at APCNWR. All groups have

educational programs. This consistent weekly schedule makes it easier for volunteers to commit, while providing the refuge with predictable support that amplifies the staff's capacity.

A key factor in this multi-group effort has been the creation of a public channel in Slack — Team Attwater (#team-attwater channel). At no cost to

individuals can contact the Coastal Prairie Chapter or the refuge directly to join this rewarding effort and make a tangible difference in Texas conservation.
