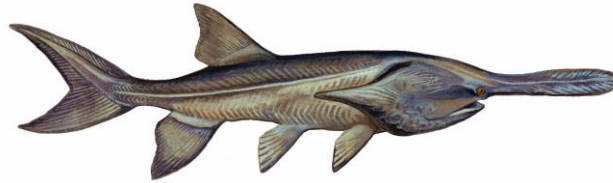




# THE PADDLEFISH

## CBTMN Meeting Minutes January 14, 2019

1. Becky called to order at 6:35 p.m. — brief explanation of meeting location change. 2. Roll call by SIGN-IN SHEET; Sign ups also to host Training Classes
3. Questions about Nov minutes? Approval? Unanimously approved.
4. Treasurer's Report? Charles Gillis went over annual financial report, copy in newsletter. \$2,000 - \$3,000 in operating expenses each year. Taking dues, will bring receipts next meeting and have them on a table at door, too many folks to try to hand out tonight.
5. Newsletter/Publicity — Tami White, Rayla Dickinson will be working together, we need more publicity on all that we do. Just snap pic as things happen, caption it, and send it to Tami or Rayla. Need more of this kind of thing all along instead of just at big events.

6. Volunteer Time/Advanced Training Time Linda wasn't at meeting, Becky went over criteria, said to shoot Linda a message with questions as volunteer projects can be confusing. Bottom line if you have 8 hours of AT and do more, some of that can count as volunteer hours.

  - d. NFWF Grant update — Ted Barrow, Charles Gillis, Pete Wright — not much to report, loggers have been in and so wet.
  - e. new walking trail — Ted Barrow, Charles Gillis, Todd Dickinson - same as above.
  - f. Boat Road Markers and Paddle Trail Markers Update — Ted and Vanessa introduced Molly Sullivan and her mom Paula Tefteller from Gilmer. Molly is doing her Gold Scout project by restoring/adding paddle trail markers. Met with board before meeting. Vanessa suggested bigger signage and marking trailheads with "start here". Kristi will be mentoring and point of contact for questions, etc.
  - g. New Training Class — Jill Wright, Susan Sedberry - have eleven as of today, with shutdown not sure how all will work but it will work out. Will be on website and newsletter. Per Jill, 60-75% are the same presenters, good news is you can count as AT even if you saw the same presenter last year. Signup sheets for hosts, be sure to come out and support the new group.

We had a great weekend of presenters, topics and FOOD, and they are now half way through their initial training requirement! Our newest members have been raving about all the delicious treats our members have been supplying them and have expressed their gratitude to our chapter for the bountiful meals and treats. Also, a thank you goes out to Pete Wright as well, for being the training class historian and taking photos of the activities and presenters.

Despite the challenges of rain, fog and thunderstorms, we were able to meet Friday evening and Saturday and enjoy presentations on several topics. Friday evening, our chapter advisor and TPWD biologist, Vanessa Neace, covered Ornithology and treated us to many fascinating slides and videos of bird behavior. A bird brain is a fascinating work of nature! She also covered Land Stewardship - a topic we all share a passion for. Saturday morning started with a presentation by Boyd Sanders, Master Interpreter of Tyler State Park. Ask our trainees who the best soap bubble blower is! Boyd covered Volunteers as Teachers, Citizen Science opportunities, and Laws and Ethics. All pertinent topics, all initiating great class discussions. Finally, our afternoon presenter, Todd McMakin of Stone Point Services, Inc. in Tyler, led a class on Archaeology. Numerous artifacts and slides of locally significant archaeological sites perked the interest of our trainees. Todd finished the day introducing our trainees to a tool used by the earliest Americans - the atlatl, a spear thrower that significantly increased the success of the hunt for various game animals. I think everyone enjoyed their hand at the atlatl - and we have some pretty good arms in this group!
