

### Prepare for Cold Weather!

The way to avoid frostbite and hypothermia is to plan for extreme cold before it arrives. Don't get caught unprepared.

- **Check the Forecast at [weather.gov](http://weather.gov) or your favorite weather app, station, etc.:** Make checking the forecast part of your regular routine so you'll know when to expect cold weather.
- **Adjust Your Schedule:** If possible, adjust your schedule to avoid being outside during the coldest part of the day, typically the early morning. Try to find a warm spot for your children while waiting for the school bus outside.
- **Protect Your Pets, Livestock and other Property:** If you have pets or farm animals, make sure they have plenty of food and water, and are not overly exposed to extreme cold. Take precautions to ensure your water pipes do not freeze. Know the temperature thresholds of your plants and crops.
- **Fill up the tank:** Make sure your car or vehicle has at least a half a tank of gas during extreme cold situations so that you can stay warm if you become stranded.
- **Dress for the outdoors** even if you don't think you'll be out much.

## Gasps and Excited Eyes

I did the Tenaha/Murvaul Christmas Bird Count on New Year's Day. I'll look it up eventually, but I think I've done this count for most of the last 20-25 years. It was dreary and cold; but then we've had many other times when it was brutally cold. The light wasn't great for discerning field marks especially on shore birds and water birds. My 87-year-old birding partner and I both had some mobility issues. We had some mechanical problems with spotting scopes. We didn't get nearly as many birds as we usually do. But as we drove back to Carthage in the cold and dark, we started talking about how excited we got when we finally got a bird on our list that normally would have been easy to find. Many times, during the day, one or the other of us would gasp and the partner would say, what are you seeing? We would look at each other with excited eyes and smile on our faces because of what our avian friends were doing or because we finally found that bird.

Why would we get so excited about a robin? Well, we went for hours without seeing one. Then we saw a flock of about 90! We got excited about the 2 phoebes we saw. I could go on... but you get the point. We got excited about finding a bird that was common because we wanted to get it on our list. Let every day be a day when you can get excited, achieve peace, put a smile on your face because you see, you hear, you smell, you touch, you simply absorb the beauty and intrigue of nature around you.
