## Advanced Training – September 18

### What does 80,000 miles of roadway have to do with prehistoric cultures or pollinators?

**Presented by** Rebekah Dobrasko of TXDOT

TxDOT helps care for the state's natural and cultural resources in tandem with the vision of building a safe and efficient transportation system. TxDOT has archeologists, vegetation specialists, wildlife biologists, karst geologists and other environmental scientists that work to manage the resources that are important to communities – all before building roads. Learn more about some of the exciting research and programs from TxDOT, such as how TxDOT is the world's largest creator of bat habitat, or why certain plants are used in the Right of Way to help important pollinators. In addition, you can learn ways to get involved with TxDOT's environmental work, or how you can get involved in planning transportation projects with the environment in mind.

**Rebekah** is an environmental program manager and lead historian at the Texas Department of Transportation. She is currently project managing the Environmental Statewide Public Engagement Plan and the **Beyond The Road** campaign.

She holds a master's degree in public history from the University of South Carolina and an undergraduate history degree from Tulane University in New Orleans.

Her recent publications include a National Register of Historic Places nomination for the West Fifth Street at Shoal Creek Bridge in Austin, Texas, an article on Texas' FM road system, entries in the Society of Architectural Historian's *Archipedia* for buildings in South Carolina, an article on the historic African American L.C. Anderson High School in Austin, and a digital and permanent exhibit on equalization schools in Charleston, South Carolina. She received the Newcomb College (of Tulane University) Young Alumna Award in 2009 for her work researching and identifying segregated schools in South Carolina (<http://scequalizationschools.org>).

Rebekah serves as a committee member for Preservation Austin and for the National Council on Public History. She is an avid volunteer in her community and is also a member of the St. Martin's Lutheran Church choir. Currently, Rebekah is working with alumni to get state and federal recognition for the L.C. Anderson High School Yellow Jacket Stadium in Austin, one of the only black public high school stadiums constructed in the state of Texas.

# NEWS

### ***NATIVE PRAIRIE REMNANT RECOGNITION***

In cooperation with our partners, Texas Parks and Wildlife and Texas AgriLife Extension Service, our chapter is taking the lead on a program to recognize landowners who have protected portions of the Tallgrass Prairie ecosystem which used to cover millions of acres stretching from Texas to Canada. If this program is successful, it may expand to the rest of the state.

A native prairie remnant is a portion of land that has never been plowed or used for crop farming; it has not been overly grazed or otherwise used in ways that would destroy the native plants and animals that live there. Historically many of these remnants were saved from other use by serving as hay meadows for the farm animals that were used to work the land before the widespread use of motorized equipment.

The July 9 *Managing for Wildlife and Livestock Symposium* in Cat Spring was the occasion to recognize five landowners in the four counties of Austin, Colorado, Fayette, and Washington. Charlotte von Rosenberg, leader of the Native Prairie Project, made the official presentations on behalf of the chapter. Each landowner received a gate sign and framed certificate.

The first five landowners to be recognized for their conservation efforts in protecting this land are:

- Fred and Bernadine Blum of Burton, Washington County
- Frank and Vickie Monk of Bellville, Austin County
- Jim and Belinda Weatherly of Industry, Austin County
- Bert and Wilda Pecore of Round Top, Fayette County, and
- Bill and Charlotte von Rosenberg of Brenham, Washington County
