#### SEPTEMBER PROGRAM

Our September program will be the Guadalupe Bass Restoration Project by Dr. Gary P. Garrett.

The Guadalupe bass (*Micropterus treculi*) occurs only in Central Texas, in streams draining the Edwards Plateau. Although relatively small for a black bass, it is a popular sport fish in these streams and was designated the State Fish of Texas in 1989. The Guadalupe bass is truly an indicator of environmental quality. When its environment is healthy, it will flourish. In some locations habitat loss has resulted in a troublesome decline in numbers of Guadalupe bass. However, the greatest threat is hybridization with smallmouth bass. For more than a decade Dr. Garrett has been working to rectify the problems and secure the future for this fish and the natural resources of Central Texas.

Since 1982, Dr. Garrett has worked as a Conservation Biologist in the Research Division of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, which is located at the Heart of the Hills Fisheries Science Center in Ingram. His research interests are centered on the conservation of natural resources in Texas and he has authored more than 60 scientific publications on the subject. He has served as the Chairman of the Desert Fishes Council, President of the Texas Organization for Endangered Species, President of the Texas Chapter of the American Fisheries Society, Editor of the Proceedings of the Desert Fishes Council, Editor of the Proceedings of the Texas Chapter of the American Fisheries Society, and Associate Editor for the Southwestern Association of Naturalists. Dr. Garrett is a member of the US Fish and Wildlife Service's Rio Grande Fishes Recovery Team, the San Marcos and Comal Springs and Associated Aquatic Ecosystems Recovery Team, and the Rio Grande Silvery Minnow Recovery Team. He is also a Fellow of the Texas Academy of Science, a Research Fellow at the University of Texas, Visiting Professor at Texas A & M University, and Adjunct Professor at Texas State University. He is on the Board of Scientists of the Chihuahuan Desert Research Institute.

This meeting will be held on **Monday, September 25** at 7:00pm at Riverside Nature Center, 150 Francisco Lemos Street in Kerrville. Social time begins at 6:30pm. For more information, contact Bob Richie at 830 257 8939.

# DOWN BY THE RIVERSIDE NATURE FESTIVAL, PLUS HUGE NATIVE TREE & PLANT SALE

This annual event, jointly sponsored by our Texas Master Naturalist Chapter and Riverside Nature Center, will be held on Saturday, October 14 from 8:00am to 3:00pm at Riverside Nature Center in Kerrville. Since this event is the annual fundraiser for our TMN Chapter, all volunteer work can be reported under **Project # HC-01-D**. Our Class of 2006 members will also be able to obtain volunteer hours at this event since it is after October 1. Admission is free, so invite your family, friends and neighbors.

The Nature Festival will include three educational presentations, including two by our Chapter members.

Our huge native tree and plant sale will offer a wide selection of plants that thrive in the Hill Country's challenging environment. We will offer native trees that grow into very large shade trees as well as trees with more moderate mature sizes. A variety of trees will be offered for both deep and shallow soils, and wet and dry locations. Late October is the best time of the entire year to plant trees in our area. Since our soil almost never freezes, the trees will be able to grow roots and be better established in the spring to face the rigors of Texas summers. Trees planted in the fall are more likely to be successful in the landscape. The large selection of perennial flowering plants, shrubs and vines offered will also benefit from fall planting, being ready to produce more blooms next year. Plant docents experienced in growing native plants will be available to assist in plant selection for any growing condition in your landscape.

The Ask the Plant Experts folks will be available for questions and plant identification from 8:00am to 3:00pm. (If you want to bring a plant for identification, please cut a piece with enough branches to show clusters of leaves and whether the branches are alternate or opposite, and enclose the entire specimen in plastic bag with a wet paper towel. Wilted or crispy specimens can pose an insurmountable identification challenge.)

We will have our TMN Chapter display near the plant sale with enthusiastic Chapter members telling the public about our program. We have invited the Master Gardeners to bring their display as well. Canoe rides on the Guadalupe River will be available from 9:00am to 2:00pm. Snacks and drinks will be available from 8:00am to 3:00pm.

Children's building activities, sponsored by Lowe's, will include *Build a Butterfly House* at 10:00am and *Build a Sailboat* at 1:00pm.

We will need lots of volunteers for this Nature Festival and Native Plant Sale. The opportunities include the pre-event setup, parking help, greeting table, TMN display table, plant sale cashiers, plant sale docents (must know about native plants), cashiers for drinks and snacks, helping with kids' building activities, helping the speakers set up, canoeing and event cleanup. Priscilla e-mailed the master volunteer sheet to our members so you can select a time slot and activity that you prefer and let her know.

#### A PAGE FROM THE HERBARIUM

#### THIS MONTH'S PLANT:

Scientific Name - Liatris mucronata

Common Names: Cusp gayfeather, gay-feather; Blazing star, Narrow-leaf gayfeather

Bloom Period: July - October

Maintenance: Cut back liatris in late fall and harvest the seed

Gayfeather is one of our area's most beautiful fall blooming perennials. Its stiff, upright, unbranched stems, 1–4 feet tall, grow in wide-spreading clumps. The tufted, purple to pale lavender flowers are densely congested in a long spike on the upper part of the stem. The leaves are narrow and crowded, becoming progressively smaller upward.

Gayfeather is commercially available and makes a wonderful addition to a fall garden. It is a butterfly nectar plant requiring full sun, low water, and preferring gravelly, rocky limestone based soils. The deer *will* browse this plant, so plant in a protected area.



Enjoy a fall visit to the Butterfly Theater in Kerrville-Schreiner Park to see a magnificent display of this drought-resistant beauty.

#### Tour of Native-scaped Yards in Boerne

Inspiration for your yard and garden will be in full bloom during the Third Annual Tour of Yards on Saturday, September 30, from 9am–1pm. Sponsored by the Cibolo Nature Center (CNC) and Native Plant Society of Texas–Boerne Chapter, the tour offers alternatives to traditional "water-hungry" landscaping with a variety of informal and more formal yards using diverse plant material with something for every visitor to enjoy.

The free, self-guided tour will feature ten spectacular yards, each one selected for its unique mixture of design, plant combinations and expressed individuality. Visit the home of a professional landscaper. Explore the yard planted with natives to keep wildlife out of the garden, and one designed to attract and feed wildlife. Walk among a collection of native and near-native wildflowers, shrubs and trees planted in "planned chaos." Muse along the stream and under the waterfall found on an old farm. Linger at the garden at the CNC's Lende Learning Center, which features a collection of trees and shrubs that grow in the Upper Cibolo drainage basin.

Jan Wrede, education director for the Cibolo Nature Center, describes the tour as a showcase for landscape enhancement through hardscape and waterscape design. Master Naturalists and horticultural experts from the CNC, Texas Department of Transportation, Native Plant Society of Texas, Texas Parks and Wildlife, and Texas Cooperative Extension Service will be on hand at various yards to educate visitors and answer questions.

Maps for the Tour, which winds its way through Boerne, Fair Oaks Ranch and other nearby neighborhoods, will be available at the CNC on the morning of September 30. ## MASTER NATURALIST MILESTONES/ACKNOWLEDGMENTS/KUDOS

**Barbara Noblin** of our Class of 2005 has achieved Certification as a Texas Master Naturalist by completing 40 hours of volunteer service and eight hours of advanced training within a 15-month period. She will receive her certificate and her dragonfly pin at our September meeting. Barbara has worked on several projects including the Old Tunnel Wildlife Management Area (popularly known as the Bat Tunnel).

**Cathy Downs** of our Class of 2005 will receive her Bronze Milestone award recognizing 250 cumulative hours of volunteer service since she became a TMN last year. Cathy chairs our Curriculum Committee and our Class of 2006 members all know her as the manager of their training.

Our yearly re-certification requirements are based on a calendar year (after the 15 months allowed to members of the new class for their initial certification)

Milestone awards are based on the service a volunteer has contributed over their Master Naturalist career. Based on these data, our Hill Country Chapter members have contributed 19,305 hours to their communities since October 2002. Using the standard value of a volunteer hour of \$18.04, our members have provided \$348,256 worth of service to their communities. That is a whole lot of teaching about nature and the environment with both children and adults, supporting nature centers and native plant display areas, monitoring water quality and interpreting bats to the public that might not have been done without our Chapter members' contributions. Congratulations to all our 121 Hill Country Chapter members for so many jobs well done!
