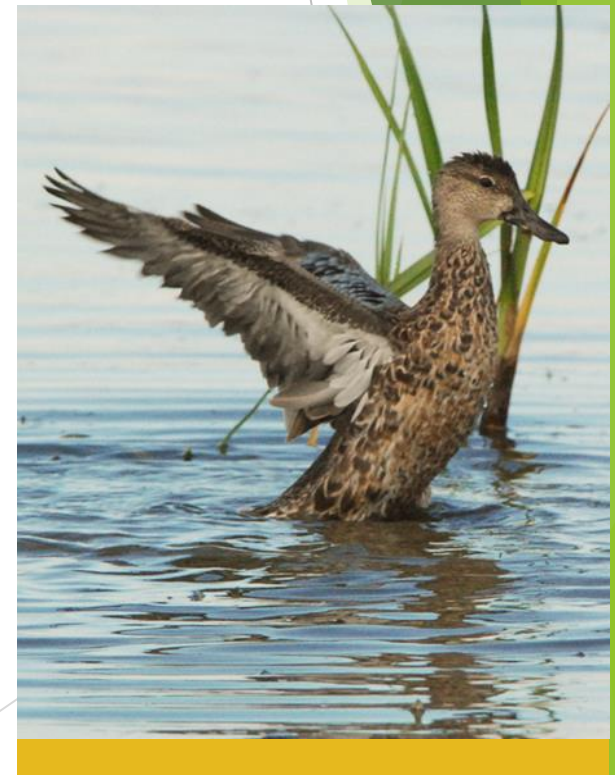

Texas Master Naturalist...



...is a state program begun in 1997 that currently includes almost 50 chapters statewide. Its mission is to develop a corps of well-informed volunteers to provide education, outreach, and service dedicated to the beneficial management of natural resources and natural areas within their communities for the State of Texas.

- Many communities and organizations rely on such citizen volunteers for implementing youth education programs; for operating parks, nature centers, and natural areas; and for providing leadership in local, natural-resource conservation efforts.
- The Cradle of Texas (COT) chapter, started in 2001, draws its members primarily from Brazoria County. Its approximately 115 members have volunteered over 175,000 hours, estimated at \$3.5 million contributed to the citizens of Brazoria County. Members volunteer at a broad range of programs and places, including:
 - County parks (e.g., camps and festivals)
 - County libraries (e.g., summer programs)
 - State Parks (e.g., camps and projects)
 - National Wildlife Refuges (e.g., Migration Celebration, school field trips, projects)
 - Sea Center Texas (as docents)
 - Gulf Coast Bird Observatory (e.g., events, native plant propagation, bird banding)
- And of course, members gather for fun and education on field trips.

- The COT Chapter is based and meets monthly on the second Wednesday of each month in the Texas A&M AgriLIFE Extension Building in Angleton. Social time and snacks at 8:30 a.m. are followed by a short meeting to discuss chapter business and to present outreach opportunities followed by Advanced Training, which includes a 10-minute talk by a member and an in-depth presentation by guest speakers—often noted specialists in their fields.



- **Your Commitment**—An active, certified Texas Master Naturalist completes 40 volunteer hours and eight Advanced Training hours each calendar year to recertify. Training can be completed by attending General Meeting presentations.

Interested?



- Any person at least 18 years old is eligible to become a Texas Master Naturalist. The COT Chapter's Intern Training classes are held at least once each year for 12 weeks. The program consists of 40 hours of classroom and field work specific to Brazoria County and is designed to provide interns the basic knowledge needed by all naturalists. Your cost for the program is \$125 and includes the State Curriculum textbook and materials, TMN-logo polo and T-shirts and a name tag.
