6:15 – 7:15 pm	Speaker : Ron Weeks Advanced Training: Using eBird and Merlin The Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology developed eBird in 2002 as an online tool for recording bird sightings and providing researchers with ways of accessing real-time data on bird distribution and abundance. They have since developed Merlin bird identification software which uses AI to match bird photographs and recordings to known photographs and recordings. Both of these tools will be introduced to the audience during the presentation along with some creative ways the on-line tools can be used. The audience is invited to download both apps to their smartphones should they wish to follow along during the presentation. This can be done by going to the App Store either for iOS or Android phones and typing in "eBird by Cornell Lab of Ornithology" and "Merlin Bird ID by Cornell Lab". Ron Weeks lives in Lake Jackson, TX with his wife of 35 years, Irenna Garapetian. Ron is a past president of the Texas Ornithological Society, a former member of the Texas Bird Records Committee, and a current advisory board member of the Gulf Coast Bird Observatory. He has been a sub-regional editor for North American Birds, a Christmas Bird Count compiler, and an eBird reviewer for many years. Ron has co-authored two books about Texas birds, A Birder's Guide to the Texas Coast and Birdlife of Houston, Galveston and the Upper Texas Coast. He also enjoys planning Texas Big Days having organized

teams that set the national record of 258 species in 2001 and the fossil fuel free (bike and foot only) national record of 193 species in 2015.

And his most recent obsession has been studying the migration by recording nocturnal migrants flying over his yard. Ron recently retired from the Dow Chemical Company in Freeport, TX to spend more time birding, working out, and supporting local ministry work.

Field Research

On the evening of October 15th, a small group gathered across from the Delores Fenwick Nature Center for a black light night supporting the City of Pearland's Fall Bat's & Blooms Bioblitz. Our Communications Director, Larry F. Peterson arrived with his bat monitor to capture the calls of bats in the area. According to Larry "bat echolocation calls triggered almost 100 (91) recordings at last night's event. 21 were automatically identified by the recording software. Most of the bats identified were Mexican Free-tailed bats (13), as we expected since we were close to the Fite Street Bridge Colony in Pearland. There were 5 identified recordings of Silver-haired bats (Lasionycteris noctivagans) and 3 recordings of Hoary bats (Lasiurus cinereus)." Additionally, our crew made several hundred observations of various species for the Bioblitz. One member even spotted the comet faintly in the evening sky. It was a productive and fun evening!


Fall Field Day

Entomology Corner

Yellow Garden Spider - Scientific Name: Argiope aurantia/Class: Arachnida

Argiope aurantia is a species of spider, commonly known as the yellow garden spider, black and yellow garden spider, golden garden spider, writing spider, zigzag spider, zipper spider, corn spider.

Yellow garden spiders are large, orb-weaving arachnids, meaning they spin a circular web. The orb weavers have an additional claw to help them spin their complex webs. In females, the top side of the abdomen is black with symmetrical patches of bright yellow. The legs are reddish brown at the base and black toward the tips. Males are smaller with brownish legs and less yellow coloration on their abdomens. Females average 0.75 to 1.1 inches in body length, which is up to three times larger than the males.

These spiders produce venom that is harmless to humans, but immobilizes prey like flies, bees and other flying insects that are caught in the web. The web contains a highly visible zigzagging X-shaped pattern called a stabilimentum. The spider may eat and re-spin its web each night.

After mating, the female deposits one or more egg sacs on her web. Offspring hatch in late summer or autumn. If they are in an area with a cold winter, the young spiders may remain in the egg sac in a dormant state and emerge in the spring. Egg cases are heavily parasitized by wasps and flies. On average, the garden spider lives for about one year. Females usually die in the first hard frost after mating. If temperatures prevent this, females may live several years, but males usually die after mating.

My neighbor told me she had a yellow garden spider spinning a web on her bathroom window screen. She described how she was very large one day, then much smaller the next time she looked at it. Then she noticed the egg sac that the spider firmly attached to the screen. A week later, she sent me a picture of the spider making another egg sac and attaching it near the first sac.
